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Stoma Team news

As we mentioned in our June newsletter a new member, Helen, has joined the team. Here Karen tells us a little more about her. (In the photo from left to right: Karen, Grainne, Helen and Elena.) Helen joined us as our new Stoma Care Specialist Nurse at the end of May. She came to us from Bedford Hospital where she has most recently been working on the neonatal unit. She also has



experience of working on adult surgical wards looking after patients with a new stoma and in critical care. She has settled into the team very well and we are delighted to have her on board. Her neonatal experience will be a real asset to us as we look after neonatal babies as well as paediatric and adult ostomists. She is participating in some virtual stoma training courses at the moment which she is finding very helpful and enjoyable.

We are delighted to hear that the team is back to full strength. We wish you all the very best Helen in the role, and we hope perhaps we may 'properly' meet you and welcome you to the group one day.

On a different matter, we recently asked Karen to tell us about arrangements should we need to visit Milton Keynes hospital, and here are the details (as of 20 August) she passed on to us.

All adult inpatient wards across the hospital have reintroduced visiting with the exception of wards 21A and 24 (which remain a patient-only area for post operative patients).

Visiting on the wards is by appointment only and restricted to one visitor, per patient, per day for 45 minutes (one hour in total including 15 minutes for arrival and departure) with a limit placed on how many visitors will be allowed on a ward and its bays at any one time to ensure social distancing can be maintained. Visiting hours are from 14.00 to 19.00 each day.

All visitors need to book an appointment by calling the ward between 09.30 and 11.30 the day before. Visitors will be given a booking reference number to gain access to the ward at the agreed visiting time. Visitors should only attend if they are not experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms and have an appropriate face covering (with exemptions taken into account).

Day trips: Coton Manor Garden, near Guilsborough, Northamptonshire, NN6 8RO

Now that the Covid restrictions are being eased we are once again beginning to stretch our wings and venture out for the day. We are hoping to provide you with some suggestions of places to go within one hour's drive of Milton Keynes – and we hope that some of you might contribute some of your own favourites. Jenny starts the ball rolling with her visit to Coton Manor Garden (approximately 32 miles each way from Milton Keynes).



I had watched the recent Carol Klein series Great British Gardens and having learnt that this garden had won the Nation's Favourite Garden award I felt that it was time to investigate. I'll quote from their website as it provides a very accurate description.

This beautiful garden at Coton Manor occupies a hillside position extending down from the 17th century manor house constructed of mellow Northamptonshire stone. The 10acre garden has luxuriant borders that delight the plant enthusiast whilst everyone will enjoy the garden's charm and special atmosphere, with colour and interest throughout the season. Beyond the garden is a magical 5acre bluebell wood and a wild flower meadow.

The Stable Yard café serves [excellent!] homemade lunches and teas. The extensive nursery has over a thousand varieties of plants, many of which are unusual and are propagated from the garden.'

The garden also has a beautiful small lake as a centre piece, with the added delights of pink flamingos strolling freely around the lawns. This has to be one of the most delightful gardens that I have visited—and I will certainly be returning as the different seasons unfold. I thoroughly recommend that you go and see for yourself.

This is Morag's review of the book *We Have Lost the President* by Paul Mathews. Her review proves that a book chosen almost at random can certainly exceed one's expectations!

It's 2044 and Britain is a democracy, with the royal family exiled to Canada. The internet has crashed and there are no mobile phones The President, Jan Polak, has vanished overnight from Buckingham Palace and no one has a clue where he is. He must be found before his crucial announcement on Independence Day, of whether he will run for office again or the Republican Party needs a new nominee. There are 50 vice presidents waiting in the wings, one of whom is the president's identical twin. The main characters are Pond, Howie Pond, the President's official

spokesman and reluctant secret service agent and his girlfriend, who happens to be a journalist. Which of them is going to find the President first? The two policemen guarding the gates of Buckingham Palace made me chuckle.

I was gripped throughout the book and didn't want to put it down.

News about suppliers: Amcare

The message from Karen is: 'Please could you reassure your members that we do keep equipment here at the hospital and although it may not be exactly the same products as they are using we would be able to supply them with an alternative so they know that they have another option in an emergency'. 
Early September allows us to plan for our Spring planting and the garden centres

Supplement to August newsletter

Answers to brain teasers in our July newsletter

1 You have six glasses lined up as shown, with three containing orange juice and three empty. How can you make the glasses alternate between full and empty glasses by moving only one of the glasses?



Answer: Pick up the second of the full glasses and pour the contents into the second of the empty glasses.
